My little oven-device, which isn't suitable for roasting meat or chicken, nevertheless served admirably for <u>that</u>, and Jimmie ate every bit of it up with gusto! He said it was excellent, and so it was, if I do say so as shouldn't. The next time we have a guest (which will be soon, since so many people were nice to us when we were in need of friends) I'm going to produce that Apple guck, as we call it. I bought some lentils & am soaking them, but so far have missed getting the hambone for soup. I hope it doesn't hurt the lentils to soak a long while – I'm changing the water frequently.
