No news other than that we have been {forced to cash a check at 43, which breaks our heart{, but it was very necessary because people insist o{n being paid in US bills.

Unfortunately it has turned cold. I {heat our apartment by means of the oven, which is {crude but effective. With that and warm woolen {undies one is reasonably thawed out by the afternoon. {Now I fervently hope that the world is not ente{ring into the seventh (or is it the 8th?) glacial period{, so primitive we are becoming! We are pionee{ring uncharted lands, deprived of all the comfort{s of civilization except red tape. Only it is much {worse than in books, of course. I wonder if we will b{e good and grateful if ever we recover the thi{ngs the people there take for granted - warmth and foo{d, or if we will only be more exigent. In one of{ the scenes of Men of Good Will2 there is a discu{ssion along these lines: the soldier coming back {from the trenches is dissatisfied because things are not {as bountiful as he had dreamed - his caviar is a trif{le off; the }hollandaise sauce hasn't enough butter in it, e}tc. Still, this sort of life does encourage the en}joyment of small pleasures. Only it makes people \stupid and avaricious over small things.

We went to the Shérers house last night a}nd I borrowed a fine Stendhal³ novel, nice} and long, into which I am about to dive} happily. I had been forced to resort to
