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Dear Mother:-

I found your letter waiting for me when I returned from New Haven about 3 o'clock Sunday morning. In order to save money we started to New Haven Saturday morning at 7 o'clock with a boy from Cleveland in his new closed Chevrolet. The charge for the round trip was \$3.00, and this was the only extra expense, as the ticket was included in the tax book. Saturday was a beautiful day for the drive, and you will be pleased to know that the driver was very careful. The car was new and he was still driving slowly to limber up the motor. We got to New Haven about 12:30 (it is about 200 miles) and went out to the Bowl after having lunch. I was disappointed in the outside appearance of the Bowl; it looks like a dirt embankment with a board fence around the top. That is because it is dug down below the surface of the ground, and on the inside it is very nice. Our seats were fine, and as you can probably tell from the sports write ups, it was a wonderful game. It is generally conceded that Dartmouth out-played Yale during the major portion of the game, and we were in the lead during the whole third quarter. However, the jinx operated again and the game was lost by one point.

After the game we called on some friends of Bob's and had dinner with them in an eating club. We left New Haven about 7:15, but due to a few stops did not get into Hanover until 3:00 A.M. On the whole it was a very worth-while trip.

In addition to all this I have an exam in History 35 Wednesday, which complicates matters a good deal. I got Prof. Williams to postpone the History 31 exam until the week after house parties, as I will be busy with the plays that week. That is the advantages of taking honors work, that you have something to say about when the exams will fall.

So far I haven't made any arrangement for Thanksgiving, and as I haven't been seeing much of Francis Dane this year, I don't think there's much chance for an invitation there. Although one of the boys at the house said something about coming to his house, I don't think I will if I can help it, as I hardly know him well enough to impose on him that much.
