

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Grade A indicates work of exceptionally high quality; grade B indicates work of superior quality, but somewhat lower than that denoted by A; grade C indicates work of medium or average quality; grade D indicates work of an inferior quality but above passing; and grade E indicates a failure.

A student passing a course with Grade A, will receive four points for each hour credit to which the course entitles him; with grade B, three points for each hour; with grade C, two points; and with grade D, one point. The requirement for the bachelor's degree is 122 semester hours and 220 points, the points being computed according to the plan stated above.

The standing of a student is the result obtained by dividing the number of points secured by the student by the number of hours for which he was registered.

The absences reported as "unexcused" consist of absences in excess of those allowed by the rules and for which no excuse has been granted.

At the end of each semester, the unexcused absences ("overcuts") from all class exercises are recorded and for each such absence one point credit will be deducted from the record for the semester.
