Dear Mother:-

I got your letter yesterday and am very glad to hear that the folks arrived from Florida all right. It is too bad Uncle Charlie is not so well; perhaps being home again will help his nerves.

I am very anxious to see then all, and I suppose that they won't run away from me either.

I seem to have mixed you up a little on the time I am coming home; it is the 14th I am arriving, and the 16th I go to work. I am surprised to hear that Walton had gone away already, as he said in a letter I had from him that he was starting the 15th, and that that was why he wanted me there for the 16th. Of the four exams left the next is history Tuesday, and I am going to start studying for it as soon as I finish this letter. So far I have been reading a French book - "Cinq Hars" by De Vigny - and writing a report on it in French, of course. I just completed it a few minutes ago. After the history exam I expect to spend the next two day studying paly sci, the next after that on French, and on Saturday I have the French exam. Sunday I will get ready for Chemestry and take the exam at three o'clock Monday. Tuesday at eight is the poly sei exam, and then I will start home. Just when I am going to pack the trunk and all the other things is more than I can say, but I suppose they will have to come in somewhere.

I saw Eddy the other day and he asked when I was going home.

He is going at the same time and we are making arrangements to come together for a change. I think his other friends are all coming at

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other times, and I know that Cy Fulton is very sick in Dick's
House. He has some severe form of arthritis (or however it is spelled)
and Eddy says he will be in the hospital for eight more weeks before
he can even go home. His Mother is here with him.

Eddy and I will arrive together on the usual 11:55 train to Columbus.
