The requirement for the bachelor's degree for classes graduating before June, 1938, is 122 hours and 220 points. For the class of 1938 and after the requirement is 120 hours and 220 points.

A student usually carries five three-hour courses each semester. In order to graduate in four years, a student must make up hours lost through failures by taking extra courses or by obtaining permission to attend summer school.

The absences reported as "unexcused" consist of absences in excess of those allowed by the rules and for which no excuse has been granted. Such absences are recorded separately for recitations and for the course in Recreational Activities required during the Freshman and Sophomore years. At the end of each semester the unexcused absences ("overcuts") are recorded and for each such absence one point credit is deducted from the record for the semester.
